51 COMPOST REIMBURSEMENT PILOT PROGRAM

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1 2	SECTION 2.(a) Definitions. – For purposes of this section, the definitions in G.S. 143-135.45 and the following definitions apply:		
3	(1) Department. – The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.		
4	(2) Eligible cost. – The cost to a farm operation for the purchase and use of		
5	compost or compost products, including transportation, equipment, soil		
6	testing, and labor costs.		
7	(3) Farming operation. – A commercial agricultural, silvicultural, orchard,		
8	forestry, or aquacultural facility or pursuit, including the care and production		
9	of livestock and livestock products, poultry and poultry products, apiary		
0	products, and plant and animal production for nonfood uses; the planting,		
1	cultivating, harvesting, and processing of crops; and the farming or ranching		
2	of any plant or animal species in a controlled salt, brackish, or freshwater		
3	environment.		
4	SECTION 2.(b) Program Established. – The Compost Reimbursement Pilot		
5	Program (Program) is established in the Department. The Program will reimburse farming		
6	operations in the State for eligible costs. The Program authorized by this section shall provide		
7	grants during the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 fiscal years. The Department is authorized to		
8	establish one time-limited position to administer the Program.		
9	SECTION 2.(c) Eligibility. – A farming operation must complete an eligibility		
0	review with the Department prior to transporting or applying any compost products for which		
1	reimbursement will be sought under this section. The purpose of the review is for the Department		
2	to ensure that (i) the proposed transport and application of compost products is consistent with		
3	the Department's agricultural pest control rules and (ii) the farming operation will allow soil		
4	sampling as necessary to establish a baseline of soil quality and amount of carbon storage to be		
5	used by the Department for reporting requirements under subsection (h) of this section.		
6	SECTION 2.(d) Application. – Application for cost reimbursement shall be made		
7	on a form accompanied with supporting information as the Department may specify, including,		
8	at a minimum, the following:		
9	(1) Documentation to verify the source, size, sale weight, or amount of compost		
0	products purchased and the cost of transportation, equipment, spreading,		
1	labor, and soil testing.		
2	(2) An affirmation from the applicant that it is not seeking reimbursement for (i)		
3	compost or compost products produced by the applicant, (ii) compost or		
4	compost products that the applicant transferred, or intends to transfer to		
5	another individual or entity, whether or not for compensation, (iii) compost or		
6	compost products that were purchased from an unpermitted facility, or (iv) the		
7	quantity of carbon stored in the soil.		
8	SECTION 2.(e) Limitation. – A farming operation may submit only one application		
9	per year for purchases made and usage costs incurred during the fiscal year. Applications for		
0	reimbursement must be filed before the end of the fiscal year in which purchases were made and		
1	usage costs incurred. Reimbursements are subject to the following limitations:		
2	(1) Farming operations may receive reimbursement for the lesser of fifty percent		
3	(50%) of eligible costs or ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).		
4	(2) Farming operations may not receive reimbursement for (i) compost or		
5	compost products produced by the farming operation, (ii) compost or compost		
6	products that it has transferred, or intends to transfer to another individual or		
7	entity, whether or not for compensation, or (iii) compost or compost products		
8	that were purchased from an unpermitted facility.		
9	SECTION 2.(f) Priority. – The Department shall prioritize small farming operations		
0	as measured by acreage in awarding reimbursement under this section.		

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SECTION 2.(g) Indemnification. – Any recipient of funds under this section shall without limit indemnify and hold harmless the State and its officers, agents, and employees from		
all claims arising out of or resulting from the compost products purchased that are reimbursed		
under this section.		
SECTION 2.(h) Report. – The Department must submit an annual report to the Joint		
Legislative Oversight Committee on Agriculture and Natural and Economic Resources no later		
than October 1 following each fiscal year in which cost reimbursements are provided under this		
section. The report shall include, at a minimum, the following:		
(1) The amount of compost for which reimbursement was sought under the		
Program.		
(2) The qualitative or quantitative effects of the Program on soil quality and		
carbon storage.		
(3) An evaluation of the benefits and costs to the State of continuing, expanding,		
or furthering the strategies explored in the Program.		
SECTION 2.(i) Funding. – There is appropriated from the General Fund to the		
Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services the sum of one hundred thousand dollars		
(\$100,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2021-2022 fiscal year for the Compost Reimbursement		
Pilot Program established by this section.		
SECTION 2.(j) Effective Date. – This section becomes effective July 1, 2021.		
SECTION 3. Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective when it becomes		
law. Section 2 of this act expires on June 30, 2025.
