7 8	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: SECTION 1.(a) Part 3 of Article 3B of Chapter 135 of the General Statutes is				
9	amended by adding a new section to read:				
10	"§ 135-48.37B. Attachment and garnishment of overpayments and unpaid premiums from				
11	individuals no longer employed by employing units.				
12	(a) Applicability. – This section applies to an individual who is no longer employed by				
13	an employing unit and to whom any of the following circumstances apply:

23	(c) <u>Attachment and Garnishment. – Intangible property that belongs to an individual, is</u>				
24	owed to an individual, or has been transferred by an individual under circumstances that would				
25 26	permit it to be levied upon if it were tangible property (i) is subject to attachment and garnishment				
26 27	in payment of an overpayment or erroneous payment or unpaid premium that is due from the				
27	individual and (ii) is collectible under this Article. Intangible personal property includes bank				
28 29	deposits, rent, salaries, wages, property held in the Escheat Fund, and any other property				
29 30	-	incapable of manual levy or delivery.			
31	<u>A person who is in possession of intangible property that is subject to attachment and</u> garnishment is the garnishee and is liable for the amount the individual owes. The liability applies				
32		only to the amount of the individual's property in the garnishee's possession, reduced by any			
33	amount the individual owes the garnishee.				
33 34		Provided any amount due remains unpaid and provided the individual has not entered into a			
35	payment plan approved by the Plan, upon the expiration of the 30 calendar days required by				
36		b) of this section, the Plan may submit to a financial institution, as defi

1	G.S. 53B-2, information that identifies an individual who owes an overpayment or erroneous			
2	payment or an unpaid premium that is collectible under this section and the amount due. The			
3	Plan may submit the information on a quarterly basis or, with the agreement of the financial			
4	institution, on a more frequent basis. A financial institution that receives the information must			
5	determine the amount, if any, of intangible property it holds that belongs to the individual and			
6	must inform the Plan of its determination. The Plan must reimburse a financial institution for its			
7	costs in providing the information, not to exceed the amount payable to the financial institution			
8	under G.S. 110-139 for providing information for use in locating a noncustodial parent.			
9	No more than ten percent (10%) of an individual's wages or salary is subject to attachment			
10	and garnishment. The wages or salary of an employee of the United States, the State, or a political			
11	subdivision of the State are subject to attachment and garnishment.			
12	(d) Notice to Garnishee. – Before the Plan attaches and garnishes intangible property in			
13	payment of an overpayment or erroneous payment or unpaid premium, the Plan must send the			
14	garnishee a notice of garnishment. The notice must be sent either in person, by certified mail with			
15	a return receipt requested, or, with the agreement of the garnishee, by electronic means. The			
16	notice must contain all of the following information:			
17	(1) <u>The individual's name.</u>			
18	(2) <u>The individual's social security number or federal identification number.</u>			
19	(3) The amount of money the individual owes the Plan.			
20	(4) An explanation of the liability of a garnishee for the amounts owed.			
21	(5) An explanation of the garnishee's responsibility concerning the notice.			
22	(e) Action. – A garnishee must comply with a notice of garnishment or file a written			
23	response to the notice within the time set in this subsection. A garnishee that is a financial			
24	institution must comply or file a response within 20 days after receiving a notice of garnishment.			
25	All other garnishees must comply or file a response within 30 days after receiving a notice of			
26	garnishment. A written response must explain why the garnishee is not subject to garnishment			
27	and attachment.			
28	Upon receipt of a written response, the Plan must contact the garnishee and schedule a			
29	conference to discuss the response or inform the garnishee of the Plan's position concerning the			
30	response. If the Plan does not agree with the garnishee on the garnishee's liability, the Plan may			
31	proceed to enforce the garnishee's liability for any amounts owed under this section by civil			
32	action.			
33	(f) <u>Limitations. – Nothing in this Part shall be construed to limit the Plan's ability to</u>			
34	pursue alternative judicial remedies against an individual, including the pursuit of a judgment			
35	and lien against real property."			
36	SECTION 1.(b) This section becomes effective October 1, 2021, and applies to			
37 38	notices of amounts due sent by the Plan on or after that date.			
	SECTION 2.(a) Part 3 of Article 3B of Chapter 135 of the General Statutes is

40	" <u>§ 135-48.37C. Third-party administrator cooperation in collection of amounts owed to</u>

40 47	this section shall not be limited by, or subject to, any agreement between a Claims Processor and			
48	the health care provider or any other provision of law that otherwise would negate or limit by			
49	time, quantity, or other means, the ability to repay or recover any amounts owed to the Plan.			
4) 50	(c) Any Claims Processor who paid any amounts owed to the Plan under subsection (a)			
51	of this section shall be responsible for recovering those amounts by all commercially reasonable

2	recovered by the Claims Processor within one year from the date the claim was paid shall be				
3	repaid to the Plan by the Claims Processor.				
4	(d) No amount due under this section may be	forgiven by a Claims Processor."			
5	SECTION 2.(b) This section is effective	when it becomes law and applies to claims			
6	paid on or after that date.
