1	damages as set forth in this subsection may also institute a civil action to enjoin and restrain		
2	future acts that would constitute a violation of this section. The venue for any civil action brought		
3	under this subsection shall be the county in which the plaintiff resides or any county in which		
4	any part of the alleged act took place, regardless of whether the defendant was ever actually		
5	present in that county. Civil actions under this subsection must be brought within three years		
6	from the date on which the identity of the wrongdoer was discovered or reasonably should have		
7	been discovered. The rights and remedies provided by this subsection are in addition to any other		
8	rights and remedies provided by law. The court, in an action brought under this subsection, may		
9	award reasonable attorneys' fees to the prevailing party.		
10	(c) This section shall not apply to the following:		
11	(1) <u>Criminal investigations.</u>

18	SECTION 2. This act becomes effective October 1, 2021, and applies to any rule,		
19	regulation, or policy adopted or enforced on or after that date.
