	to register to vote or update the voter's registration on its website.

	an individual described in subsection (a) of this section to submit:

	individual has a valid drivers license corresponding to the provided date of birth and social
	security number, and no duplicate registration is found, the State Board shall obtain the
	individual's electronic signature, as provided in Article 11A of Chapter 66 of the General
	Statutes, from the Division of Motor Vehicles and forward the application to the appropriate
	county board of elections for verification in accordance with G.S. 163-82.7.
	(e) If the State Board cannot verify the North Carolina drivers license, date of birth, or
	social security number in accordance with G.S. 163-82.12, or the individual fails to provide all
	of the information required by this section, the State Board shall deny the application and so
	notify the individual submitting the application in accordance with this Article. That individual shall not be denied another opportunity to register to vote in accordance with this Article.
	(f) The State Board may adopt rules to implement this section, including rules imposing
	additional authentication requirements to ensure the security of the internet website required by
	this section and the data submitted to the State Board.
	(g) Nothing in this section shall prohibit the State Board from adopting rules that provide
	for immediate verification of the individual's application."

	develop an application form for voter registration. Any person may use the form to apply to do
	any of the following:
	(1) Register to vote.
	(2) Change party affiliation or unaffiliated status.
	(3) Report a change of address within a county.
	(4) Report a change of name.
	The county board of elections for the county where the applicant resides shall accept the form
	as application for any of those purposes if the form is submitted as set out in G.S. 163-82.3.in

	<b>SECTION 2.(c)</b> G.S. 163-82.6 reads as rewritten:

2	(a) How the Form May Be Submitted. – The county board of elections shall accept any		
3	form described in G.S. 163-82.3 if the applicant submits the form in person, by mail, facsimile		
4	transmission, transmission of a scanned document, or in person. document, or transmission on		
5	the State Board's website. The applicant may delegate the submission of the form to another		
6	person. Any person who communicates to an applicant acceptance of that delegation shall deliver		
7	that form so that it is received by the appropriate county board of elections in time to satisfy the		
8	registration deadline in subdivision (1) or (2) of subsection (d) of this section for the next election.		
9	It shall be a Class 2 misdemeanor for any person to communicate to the applicant acceptance of		
10	that delegation and then fail to make a good faith effort to deliver the form so that it is received		
11	by the county board of elections in time to satisfy the registration deadline in subdivision (1) or		
12	(2) of subsection (d) of this section for the next election. It shall be an affirmative defense to a		
13	charge of failing to make a good faith effort to deliver a delegated form by the registration		
14	deadline that the delegatee informed the applicant that the form would not likely be delivered in		
15	time for the applicant to vote in the next election. It shall be a Class 2 misdemeanor for any		
16	person to sell or attempt to sell a completed voter registration form or to condition its delivery		
17	upon payment.

19	(d) Registration Deadlines for a Primary or Election. – In order to be valid for a primary		
20	or election, the form:		
21	(1) If submitted by mail, must be postmarked at least 25 days before the primary		
22	or election, except that any mailed application on which the postmark is		
23	missing or unclear is validly submitted if received in the mail not later than 20		
24	days before the primary or election, election.		
25	(2) If submitted in person, by facsimile transmission, or by transmission of a		
26	scanned document, or transmission on the State Board's website, must be		
27	received by the county board of elections by a time established by that board,		
28	but no earlier than 5:00 P.M., on the twenty-fifth day before the primary or		
29	election, election.		
30	(3) If submitted through a delegatee who violates the duty set forth in subsection		
31	(a) of this section, must be signed by the applicant and given to the delegatee		
32	not later than 25 days before the primary or election, except as provided in		
33	subsection (f) of this section.

35	<b>SECTION 2.(d)</b> G.S. 163-82.10(a1) reads as rewritten:		
36	"(a1) Personal Identifying Information. – Full or partial social security numbers, dates of		
37	birth, the identity of the public agency at which the voter registered under G.S. 163-82.20, any		
38	electronic mail address submitted under this Article, Article 20, or Article 21A of this Chapter,		
39	photocopies of identification for voting, any electronic data associated with online voter		
40	registration under G.S. 163-82.5A, and drivers license numbers, whether held by the State Board		
41	or a county board of elections, are confidential and shall not be considered public records and		
42	subject to disclosure to the general public under Chapter 132 of the General Statutes. Cumulative		
43	data based on those items of information may be publicly disclosed as long as information about

48 **SECTION 2.(e)** The State Board of Elections may begin rulemaking in accordance 49 with G.S. 163-82.5A, as enacted by this act, prior to December 1, 2021, but no temporary or 50 permanent rule shall become effective prior to December 1, 2021. The State Board of Elections

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1	may initiate any needed requests for proposals for development of the secure internet site, as
2	required by G.S. 163-82.5A, as enacted by this act, prior to December 1, 2021.

4	PART III. FUNDS TO ESTABLISH A PROGRAM TO IDENTIFY AND ASSIST
5	VOTERS NEEDING PHOTO IDENTIFICATION
6	<b>SECTION 3.</b> It is the intent of the General Assembly to fund a program in the
7	2021-2022 fiscal year budget in which the State Board of Elections shall identify individuals in
8	this State who need photo identification to vote in person. The program shall include a mobile
9	component to visit individuals identified as needing photo identification to vote in person to
10	ensure such photo identification is created for those individuals.

12	PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATE
13	<b>SECTION 4.</b> Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective when it becomes
14	law.
