2	AN ACT TO CREATE A HIGH-IMPACT TUTORING GRANT PROGRAM TO ADDRESS					
3	LEARNING LOSS RESULTING FROM THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC.					
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:					
5	SECTION 1. The Department of Public Instruction shall establish a High-Impact					
6	Tutoring Grant Program (Program) to enable public school units to provide tutors for students to					
7	address learning loss and unfinished learning resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. The					
8	Program aims to serve as many students as possible, including low-income, underserved, and					
9	rural students, by providing high-impact tutoring services that will improve academic					
10	performance. The Program shall begin in the 2022-2023 school year and conclude at the end of					
11	the 2024-2025 school year.					
12	SECTION 2.(a) The Department of Public Instruction shall develop an application					
13	process for the Program. All public school units may apply for the Program. As part of the					
14	application process, the Department shall require each applicant to provide at least the following					
15	information:					
16	(1) A high-impact tutoring plan as described in subsection (b) of this section.					
17	(2) The methods that will be used to determine which students will participate in					
18	the tutoring program.					
19	(3) The number of students expected to be served by the tutoring program.					
20	(4) The projected cost of implementing the tutoring program.					
21	(5) The methods to be used for measuring student academic progress and other					
22	tutoring program outcomes.					
23	(6) Whether the public school unit will create its own tutoring program or partner					
24	with existing tutoring providers.					
25	(7) The academic subjects that will be the focus of the tutoring program.					
26	(8) The methods to be used for recruiting and supporting tutors.					
27	(9) The ways in which tutoring will be delivered, including how the delivery will					
28	accommodate remote learning.					
29	(10) An overview of the curriculum tutors will be required to use, if any.					
30	(11) The ways in which the tutoring program will provide ongoing professional					
31	training and development for tutors.					
32	(12) A schedule showing how the tutoring session will be completed during					
33	existing class time.

23	SECTION 9. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the				
24	Public Instruction the sum of twenty-three million dollars (\$23,000,000) in non	-			
25	for both the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 fiscal years, and the sum of forty-five				
26	(\$45,000,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2024-2025 fiscal year, to allow students in public				
27	school units to access high-impact tutoring pursuant to the Program.				
28	When developing the base budget, as defined by G.S. 143C-1-1, for each fiscal year				
29	specified in this section, the Director of the Budget shall include the appropriated amount for that				
30	fiscal year.				
31	SECTION 10. This act becomes effective July 1, 2022.
