A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO PROVIDE PROPERTY TAX DEFERRAL AS AN ALTERNATIVE FORM OF PROPERTY TAX RELIEF FOR THE ELDERLY AND DISABLED AND, IF A STATE-OPERATED LOTTERY IS IMPLEMENTED, TO INCREASE THE PROPERTY TAX HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION FOR THE ELDERLY AND DISABLED AND REIMBURSE LOCAL GOVERNMENTS FOR THEIR REVENUE LOST DUE TO THE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. G.S. 105-277.1 reads as rewritten:

"§ 105-277.1. ~~Property classified for taxation at reduced valuation.~~ tax relief for the elderly and disabled.

(a) Classification. ~~The following class of property~~ Real property or a manufactured home owned and occupied by a qualifying owner as the owner's permanent residence is designated a special class of property under Article V, Sec. 2(2) of the North Carolina Constitution and shall be assessed for taxation as follows. ~~Constitution and is taxable in accordance with this section.~~ A qualifying owner may elect property tax relief for this classified property in the form of a homestead exclusion or property tax deferral as provided in subsection (c) of this section. To qualify for the homestead exclusion under this section, an owner must meet all of the following requirements as of January 1 preceding the taxable year for which the benefit is claimed:

(1) Be a North Carolina resident.

(2) Be at least 65 years old or totally and permanently disabled.

(3) Have an income for the immediately preceding calendar year of not more than eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000).

1 To qualify for property tax deferral under G.S. 105-277.1B, an owner must meet all of
2 the following requirements as of January 1 preceding the taxable year for which the
3 benefit is claimed:

- 4 (1) Be a North Carolina resident.
- 5 (2) Be at least 65 years old or totally and permanently disabled.
- 6 (3) Have an income for the immediately preceding calendar year of not
7 more than twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).

8 ~~The first twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) in assessed value of real property, or a~~
9 ~~mobile home, owned by a North Carolina resident and occupied by the owner as his~~
10 ~~permanent residence shall not be assessed for taxation if, as of January 1 of the year for~~
11 ~~which the benefit of this section is claimed:~~

- 12 (1) ~~The owner is either 65 years of age or older or is totally and~~
13 ~~permanently disabled; and~~
- 14 (2) ~~The owner's disposable income for the preceding calendar year did not~~
15 ~~exceed eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000); and~~
- 16 (3) ~~The owner makes the required application.~~

17 ~~For married applicants residing with their spouses, the disposable income of both~~
18 ~~spouses must be included, whether or not the property is in both names.~~

25 plus all other money received from every source other than gifts and

27 married applicants residing with their spouses, the income of both
28 spouses must be included, whether or not the property is in both
29 names.

30 (1c) An 'owner' of property means a Owner. – A person who holds legal or
31 equitable title to the property, either individually or whether
32 individually, as a tenant by the entirety, a joint tenant, or a tenant in
33 common, or as the holder of a life estate or an estate for the life of
34 another. Property owned and occupied by husband and wife as tenants
35 by the entirety shall be is entitled to the full benefit of this classification
36 notwithstanding that only one of them meets the age or disability
37 requirements herein provided of this section. If the residence is a mobile A
38 manufactured home and is jointly owned by husband and wife, it shall
39 be treated as wife is considered property held by the entirety. When
40 property is owned by two or more persons other than husband and wife
41 and one or more of such the owners qualifies for this classification,
42 each qualifying owner shall be is entitled to the full a proportionate
43 amount of the exclusion property tax relief not to exceed his or her
44 proportionate share of the valuation of the property. No part of an

~~exclusion—the relief available to one co-owner may be claimed by any other co-owner and in no event shall the total exclusion allowed to a qualifying residence (including the household personal property therein) exceed twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000). co-owner.~~

(2) ~~" Disposable income" means adjusted gross income as defined for North Carolina income tax purposes in G.S. 105-141.3 plus all other moneys received from every source other than gifts or inheritances received from a spouse, lineal ancestors, or lineal descendants.~~

(3) ~~'Permanent residence' means legal residence.~~ Permanent residence. – A person's legal residence. It includes the dwelling, the dwelling site, not to exceed one acre, and related improvements. The dwelling may be a single family residence, a unit in a multi-family residential complex—complex, or a mobile—manufactured home. Notwithstanding the occupancy requirements of this classification, an otherwise qualified applicant shall—does not lose the benefit of the exclusion—property tax relief because of a temporary absence from his or her permanent residence for reasons of health, or because of an extended absence while confined to a rest home or nursing home, so long as the residence is unoccupied or occupied by the applicant's spouse or other dependent.

(3a) Property tax relief. – Homestead exclusion and property tax deferral.

(4) ~~A 'totally and permanently disabled person' means one who~~ Totally and permanently disabled. – A person is totally and permanently disabled if the person has a physical or mental impairment which—that substantially precludes him or her from obtaining gainful employment and such impairment—appears reasonably certain to continue without substantial improvement throughout his lifetime—or her life.

(c) Election. – A qualified owner may elect one of the following kinds of property tax relief:

(1) To defer payment of all or part of any future increases in the amount of tax levied on the permanent residence to the extent allowed under G.S. 105-277.1B.

(2) To exclude from taxation the first twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) in appraised value of the permanent residence.

When property is owned by two or more persons who qualify for this classification, the election made by the qualified owners must be the same.

~~(e) (d) Application. — Applications for the exclusions provided by this section are to be filed during the regular listing period, but, shall—~~ An application for property tax relief provided by this section should be filed during the regular listing period, but may be filed and must be accepted at any time up to and through April 15 of the calendar preceding the tax year for which they are to be effective—the relief is claimed. The application form provided by a county for deferral must state the conditions under which deferred taxes and interest become due and payable and must also state that

1 interest will accrue on the amount deferred and that this amount constitutes a lien. Each
2 applicant who elects the deferral method of property tax relief shall furnish a list of the
3 amounts of all liens on the property for which tax deferral is sought and the holders of
4 these liens. When property is owned by two or more persons other than husband and
5 wife and one or more of them qualifies for ~~this exclusion,~~ property tax relief, each such
6 owner shall apply separately for his or her proportionate share of the ~~exclusion-relief.~~

7 (1) Elderly Applicants. – Persons 65 years of age or older may apply for
8 ~~this exclusion—property tax relief~~ by entering the appropriate
9 information on a form made available by the assessor under G.S. 105-
10 282.1.

11 (2) Disabled Applicants. – Persons who are totally and permanently
12 disabled may apply for ~~this exclusion—property tax relief~~ by (i) entering
13 the appropriate information on a form made available by the assessor
14 under G.S. 105-282.1 and (ii) furnishing acceptable proof of their
15 disability. Such proof shall be in the form of a certificate from a
16 physician licensed to practice medicine in North Carolina or from a
17 governmental agency authorized to determine qualification for
18 disability benefits. After a disabled applicant has qualified for this
19 classification, he or she shall not be required to furnish an additional
20 certificate unless the applicant's disability is reduced to the extent that
21 the applicant could no longer be certified for ~~the taxation at reduced~~

23 Sec. 2. Chapter 105 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new
24 section to read:

25 "**§ 105-277.1B. Deferral of residential tax increases for qualified owners.**

26 (a) Deferral. – A qualified owner under G.S. 105-277.1 may elect to defer
27 payment of all or part of any future increases in the amount of tax levied on the
28 permanent residence to the extent permissible under subsection (c) of this section unless
29 (i) the property is subject to a lien that, pursuant to a federal law, rule, or regulation,
30 prohibits deferral of taxes or (ii) the amount of outstanding liens on the property
31 exceeds eighty-five percent (85%) of the assessed value of the property. The amount of
32 the tax increase that may be deferred each year is the amount by which the tax due on
33 the residence for that year exceeds the amount of tax that was due on the residence for
34 the year preceding the owner's application for deferral under G.S. 105-277.1, reduced by
35 a percentage equal to the percentage by which the assessed value of the residence
36 exceeds one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000). The amount of taxes deferred
37 shall accrue interest at the rate specified in G.S. 105-241.1(i) for assessments from the
38 date the tax is otherwise due until payment. The amount of deferred taxes and accrued
39 interest shall constitute a lien on the property, which shall attach at the time prescribed
40 in G.S. 105-355 and shall have the priority established in G.S. 105-356.

41 (b) Notification of Additional Liens. – The owner of tax-deferred property shall
42 notify the assessor of the amount and holder of any new lien against the property arising
43 after application for deferral has been made within 60 days of the creation of the new
44 lien.

1 (c) Transfer or Disqualification of Property. – Payment of taxes deferred under
2 this section may be deferred until the death of the owner or until the property is
3 transferred, at which time the full amount of deferred taxes and interest shall become
4 due and shall be paid within nine months after the date of death or transfer, unless the
5 property is transferred to the former owner's spouse and the spouse is 65 years of age or
6 older and occupies the property as his or her permanent residence, in which case the
7 spouse may elect to continue deferring payment of the tax. If the owner of tax-deferred
8 property does not meet the income requirements of G.S. 105-277.1(a) as of January 1
9 preceding a taxable year, the owner may not defer any increase in property tax that
10 occurs that year, but the deferred taxes from earlier years do not become due because of
11 the owner's failure to meet the income requirements for the current year.

12 Except as provided in G.S. 105-277.1(b)(3), in any year in which the owner of tax-
13 deferred property no longer occupies the property as his or her permanent residence no
14 tax levied on the property for that year may be deferred and the full tax for that year is
15 due on the date established in G.S. 105-360. If the owner of tax-deferred property fails
16 to occupy the property as his or her permanent residence for three successive years, the
17 full amount of deferred taxes and interest shall become due that third year and shall be
18 due and payable at the same time the tax levied on the property in that year is otherwise
19 due. In any year in which the total amount of deferred taxes, interest, and other
20 unsatisfied liens on the property exceeds eighty-five percent (85%) of the assessed value
21 of the property, the assessor shall notify the owner that the portion of deferred taxes and
22 interest that exceeds the eighty-five percent (85%) limit is due and must be paid within
23 60 days after receipt of the notice. Failure to pay an amount due under this subsection
24 shall cause the total amount of deferred taxes and interest to become due and payable at
25 the same time the tax levied on the property in the year in which the failure occurs is
26 otherwise due.

27 (d) Annual Notification to Property Owner. – On or before September 1 of each
28 year, the assessor shall notify each property owner to whom a tax deferral has
29 previously been granted of the accumulated sum of deferred taxes and interest.

30 (e) Prepayment. – All or part of the deferred taxes and accrued interest may be
31 paid to the tax collector at any time. Any partial payment shall be applied first to
32 accrued interest. A property owner to whom a tax deferral has previously been granted
33 may revoke the application for deferral at any time by notifying the assessor in writing;
34 however, an owner may not elect to pay taxes upon the property at a reduced value
35 under G.S. 105-277.1 unless all of the deferred taxes and accrued interest have been
36 paid to the tax collector.

37 (f) Payment by Trustee or Mortgagee. – A mortgagee or trustee that elects to pay
38 any tax deferred by the owner of property subject to the mortgage or deed of trust does
39 not thereby acquire a right to foreclose.

40 (g) Clauses Preventing Application for Deferral Void. – Except for requirements
41 dictated by federal law, rule, or regulation, any provision in a mortgage, deed of trust, or
42 other agreement that prohibits the owner from electing to defer taxes on property under
43 G.S. 105-277.1 is void.

1 (h) Construction. – This section does not prevent the collection of personal
2 property taxes that become a lien against tax-deferred property."

21 beginning on or after the second July 1 after a State-operated lottery is implemented in
22 this State, the income eligibility limit is the amount for the preceding year increased by
23 the same percentage of this amount as the percentage by which the federal government
24 increased the benefits under Titles II and XVI of the Social Security Act during the
25 calendar year preceding the year in which the determination of a new income limit is
26 made, rounded to the nearest one hundred dollars (\$100.00). On or before July 1 of
27 each year, the Department of Revenue shall determine the income eligibility amount to
28 be in effect for the taxable year beginning the following July 1 and shall notify the

30 (c2) Index Amount. – The initial index amount for the homestead exclusion is
31 twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the five taxable years beginning on or after
32 the first July 1 after a State-operated lottery is implemented in this State. Every fifth
33 taxable year after the initial index amount becomes effective, the index amount is
34 increased by a percentage equal to one-half the percentage increase in the Consumer
35 Price Index for the most recent five-year period for which the information is available,
36 rounded to the nearest one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Each new index amount remains
37 in effect for five years.

38 The Department of Revenue shall calculate a new index amount to be in effect every
39 fifth year beginning April 1 of the fifth taxable year beginning on or after July 1 after a
40 State-operated lottery is implemented. The Department shall notify the assessor of each
41 county by April 1 of the amount to be in effect for the taxable year beginning the
42 following July 1.

29 (a) On ~~September 1, 1990,~~ December 1 of each year, the tax collector of each
 30 county and the tax collector of each city shall furnish to the Secretary of Revenue a list
 31 containing the name and address of each person who has qualified in that year for the
 32 ~~exemption-homestead exclusion~~ provided in G.S. 105-277.1. The list shall also contain
 33 for each name the total amount of property ~~exempted, excluded,~~ the tax rate the property
 34 is subject to, and the product obtained by multiplying those two numbers by each other.
 35 ~~The lists-~~ Each list shall be accompanied by an affidavit attesting to the accuracy of the
 36 list, and shall all be on a form prescribed by the Secretary of Revenue.

2 taxable years beginning on or after the first July 1 after a State-operated lottery is
