February 9, 1993 1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE LEGISLATIVE STUDY COMMISSION ON CHILD 2 CARE ISSUES. 3 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: 4 Section 1. Chapter 120 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new 5 6 Article to read: 7 "ARTICLE 12J. "LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION ON CHILD CARE ISSUES. 8 9 10 "§ 120-70.90. Commission established. The Legislative Commission on Child Care Issues is established as a permanent 11 commission. As used in this Article, the term 'Commission' means the Legislative 12 Commission on Child Care Issues. 13 "§ 120-70.91. Powers and duties; study. 14 15 The Commission shall study State government policy and programs affecting child care issues, specifically addressing child care issues from the point of existing laws, 16 governmental programs needed or already functioning, and current child care issues. 17 18 The Commission shall work in close collaboration with all agencies and programs dealing with child care. Among the issues the Commission may consider studying are: 19 20 Prior recommendations of other study commissions that have reviewed (1) 21 child day care and other child care services since 1980 and an assessment of compliance with these recommendations; 22 23 The advantages and costs associated with measures to improve the (2)

quality of child care, including lowering staff/child ratios, enhancing

37	The Commission shall have its initial meeting no later than September 1, 1993, at	
38	the call of the Speaker of the House and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. The	
39	Speaker of the House and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall each appoint a	
40	cochair from the membership of the Commission. The membership shall meet upon the

call of the cochair.

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 The Commission members shall receive no salary for serving but shall receive necessary subsistence and travel expenses in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, and 138-6 as applicable.

"§ 120-70.94. Additional powers.

The Commission may hold public meetings across the State to solicit public input with respect to the issues of child care.

The Commission shall have authority to obtain information and data from all State officers, agents, agencies, and departments while in the discharge of its duties, pursuant to the provisions of G.S. 120-19, as if it were a committee of the General Assembly. The Commission shall have the authority to call witnesses, compel testimony relevant to any matter properly before the Commission, and subpoena relevant records and documents. The provisions of G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4 shall apply to the proceedings of the Commission as if it were a joint committee of the General Assembly. In addition to the other signatures required for the issuance of a subpoena under this section, the subpoena shall also be signed by the cochair of the Commission. Any cost of providing information to the Commission not covered by G.S. 120-19.3 may be reimbursed by the Commission from funds available for the Commission's work.

The Commission shall report its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly and the Governor no later than February 1 of each odd-numbered year. The Commission may report no later than June 1 of each even-numbered year to the General Assembly and the Governor.

"<u>§ 120-70.95. Staffing.</u>

At the request of the Commission, the Legislative Services Commission may supply members of the staff of the Legislative Services Office and clerical assistance to the Commission as it considers appropriate. The Commission may, with the approval of the Legislative Services Commission, meet in the State Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building."

- Sec. 2. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the General Assembly the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year and the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year, to fund the Legislative Study Commission on Child Care Issues.
 - Sec. 3. This act becomes effective July 1, 1993.
