A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 2 AN ACT TO ENACT THE EDUCATION AND ECONOMIC COMPETITIVENESS 3 ACT OF 2005. 4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: 5 PART I. TITLE OF ACT AND TABLE OF CONTENTS 6 7 8 **SECTION 1.1.** This act shall be known as the "Education and Economic 9 Competitiveness Act of 2005". 10 INVESTING MORE RESOURCES AND DEMANDING MORE 11 PART II. ACCOUNTABILITY 12 13 FULLY FUND THE LOW-WEALTH FORMULA OVER TWO YEARS AND 14 15 **REQUIRE REPORTS ON THE EXPENDITURE OF THESE FUNDS** SECTION 2.1.(a) The General Assembly finds that it is appropriate to 16 provide supplemental funds in low-wealth counties to allow those counties to enhance 17 the instructional program and student achievement. Therefore, there is appropriated 18 from the General Fund to the Department of Public Instruction the sum of sixteen 19 million five hundred fifty thousand one hundred eleven dollars (\$16,550,111) for the 20 2005-2006 fiscal year and fifty-eight million five hundred twenty-seven thousand six 21 22 hundred thirty-five dollars (\$58,527,635) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to be used for 23 supplemental funds for the schools. SECTION 2.1.(b) Use of Funds for Supplemental Funding. – It is the intent 24 that the additional funds appropriated in 2005-2006 and 2006-2007 be used to recruit 25 and retain high quality teachers. To that end, at least fifteen percent (15%) in the 26 2005-2006 fiscal year and at least twenty-five percent (25%) in the 2006-2007 fiscal 27

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year shall be used for: (i) bonuses to recruit and retain instructional personnel; and/or 1 2 (ii) to provide full-time mentors for instructional personnel and instructional support 3 personnel. All remaining funds received pursuant to this section shall be used for: (i) and/or (ii) above and/or; (iii) to provide instructional positions, instructional support 4 5 positions, teacher assistant positions, clerical positions, school computer technicians, 6 instructional supplies and equipment, staff development, and textbooks; (iv) for salary 7 supplements for instructional personnel and instructional support personnel; and (v) to 8 pay an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) of the plant operation 9 contract cost charged by the Department of Public Instruction for services.

10 **SECTION 2.1.(c)** Reports on the Expenditure of Funds. – Local boards of education shall report to the State Board of Education by August 31 of each year on the 11 12 expenditure of these funds and how these funds were targeted and used to implement specific improvement strategies of each local school administrative unit and its schools, 13 such as teacher recruitment, closing the achievement gap, improving student 14 15 accountability, addressing the needs of at-risk students, and establishing and 16 maintaining safe schools. The State Board of Education shall report this information 17 annually by October 31 to the Office of State Budget and Management, the Joint 18 Legislative Education Oversight Committee, and the Fiscal Research Division.

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20 CONTINUE DISADVANTAGED STUDENT SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING AND 21 EVALUATE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF IMPROVEMENT STRATEGIES

22 **SECTION 2.2.(a)** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 23 Department of Public Instruction the sum of twenty-two million five hundred thousand 24 dollars (\$22,500,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of twenty-two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$22,500,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to address the 25 capacity needs of local school administrative units to meet the needs of disadvantaged 26 27 students. For the 2005-2006 fiscal year only, these funds shall continue the nonrecurring funding that was provided to local school administrative units in the 2004-2005 fiscal 28 29 year. For the 2006-2007 fiscal year, these funds shall be allocated under a new formula 30 as determined by the State Board of Education.

SECTION 2.2.(b) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 31 32 Department of Public Instruction the sum of one million five hundred eighty-five 33 million dollars (\$1,585,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of one million five hundred ten thousand dollars (\$1,510,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to evaluate 34 35 the Disadvantaged Students Supplemental Fund program. The State Board of Education shall use funds appropriated in this section to annually evaluate the strategies local 36 school administrative units have implemented and to assess their impact on student 37 38 performance. The State Board of Education shall report the results of the evaluation to 39 the Office of State Budget and Management, the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, and the Fiscal Research Division, by February 15, 2006, and by January 15 40 of each subsequent year. 41

42 **SECTION 2.2.(c)** The State Board of Education shall incorporate into a new 43 funding mechanism: (i) the results of the evaluation of strategies implemented in the 44 2004-2005 and 2005-2006 school years; and (ii) its review of the variables that are most

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highly correlated with student academic achievement. The new funding mechanism
shall consolidate the Improving Student Accountability allotment category, the
At-Risk/Alternative Schools allotment category, and the Disadvantaged Student
allotment category. The State Board of Education shall report on the new formula and
funding mechanism to the Office of State Budget and Management, the Fiscal Research
Division, and the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by February 15,
2006.

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The new formula shall be implemented in the 2006-2007 fiscal year.

9 **SECTION 2.2.(d)** Funds appropriated under this section shall be used to 10 implement a plan jointly developed by each local school administrative unit and the LEA Assistance Program team that is based upon the needs of the students not 11 12 achieving grade level proficiency. Prior to the allotment of these funds, the plan shall be 13 approved by the State Board of Education. All funds received pursuant to this section 14 shall be used only consistent with the policies and procedures adopted by the State 15 Board of Education (i) to provide instructional positions or instructional support positions and/or professional development; (ii) to provide intensive in-school and/or 16 17 after-school remediation; and (iii) to purchase diagnostic software and progress 18 monitoring tools. These funds shall not be used for teacher bonuses and supplements.

19 **SECTION 2.2.(e)** The State Board of Education may require local school 20 administrative units receiving funding under the Disadvantaged Student Supplemental 21 Fund to purchase the Education Value Added Assessment System in order to provide 22 in-depth analysis of student performance and help identify strategies for improving 23 student achievement.

SECTION 2.2.(f) To remain eligible for the resources provided in this section, local school administrative units must submit a report to the State Board of Education by August 31 of each year detailing the expenditure of the funds and the impact of these funds on student achievement. The State Board of Education shall report this information annually by October 31 to the Office of State Budget and Management, the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, and the Fiscal Research Division.

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PROVIDE FOR NEW ACCOUNTABILITY FOR THE USE OF FUNDS IN THE AT-RISK AND IMPROVING STUDENT ACCOUNTABILITY ALLOTMENTS

33 SECTION 2.3.(a) Funds appropriated for the At-Risk/Alternative Schools 34 allotment and the Improving Student Accountability allotment shall be used consistent 35 with the policies and procedures adopted by the State Board of Education only (i) to 36 provide instructional positions or instructional support positions and/or professional 37 development; (ii) to provide intensive in-school and/or after-school remediation; and 38 (iii) to purchase diagnostic software and progress monitoring tools.

SECTION 2.3.(b) To remain eligible for funds appropriated for the At-Risk/Alternative Schools allotment and the Improving Student Accountability allotment, local school administrative units must submit a report to the State Board of Education by October 31 of each year detailing the expenditure of the funds and the impact of these funds on student achievement. The State Board of Education shall report 1 this information annually by October 31 to the Office of State Budget and Management,

- 2 the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, and the Fiscal Research Division.
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LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEM ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

5 **SECTION 2.4.(a)** All assistance to local school administrative units that is 6 provided on behalf of the State Board of Education by the Department of Public 7 Instruction and its contractors shall be consolidated into the LEA Assistance Program 8 (LEAAP) created in the 2003 Session of the General Assembly. The consolidated 9 program shall reside in the School Improvement Division and shall provide assistance to 10 the State's low-performing Local School Administrative Units (LEAs) and shall assist schools in meeting adequate yearly progress in each subgroup identified in the No Child 11 12 Left Behind Act of 2001.

13 **SECTION 2.4.(b)** To accomplish this, up to six million five hundred 14 thousand dollars (\$6,500,000) shall be transferred from within existing appropriations to 15 the LEAAP. These funds shall come from appropriations currently supporting positions 16 and related operating costs within the Department of Public Instruction for school 17 improvement teams and for Closing the Gap, and from the funds appropriated to the 18 State Public School Fund being used for contractual services and associated costs for 19 the assistance teams.

20 **SECTION 2.4.(c)** The State Board of Education shall develop: (i) the 21 criteria for LEA Assistance Teams; (ii) the criteria for selecting LEAs and schools to receive assistance; (iii) measurable goals and objectives for the assistance program; and 22 23 (iv) an explanation of the type of assistance to be provided with these combined 24 resources. The Department shall develop a revised organizational structure and budget 25 for providing assistance services to LEAs to ensure the department can meet the needs of the LEAs. This structure and budget must be approved by the State Board of 26 27 Education.

For 2005-2006 only, the State Board may, with the prior approval of the Office of State Budget and Management, transfer General Fund appropriations between personal service and nonpersonal service line items within this fund to structure itself most efficiently for the delivery of services. All funds transferred under this provision are only for this program and for the services described herein. Funds shall not be used to raise the salary of existing employees.

SECTION 2.4.(d) The State Board of Education shall report to the Office of State Budget and Management, the Fiscal Research Division, and the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the criteria and the new organizational structure, proposed budget, functions, and projected workloads for the 2005-2006 academic year by August 1, 2005.

The State Board shall report on the prior year's expenditure of these funds by August 31 of each year. This report shall contain: (i) the criteria for selecting LEAs and schools to receive assistance; (ii) measurable goals and objectives for the assistance program; (iii) an explanation of the assistance provided; (iv) findings from the assistance program; (v) actual expenditures by category; (vi) recommendations

regarding the continuation of this program; and (vii) any other information the State 1 2 Board deems necessary. 3 These funds shall not revert at the end of each fiscal year but shall remain 4 available until expended for this purpose. 5 6 PART III. RECRUITING AND RETAINING QUALITY TEACHERS AND 7 PRINCIPALS ACROSS THE STATE 8 9 UNC-NCCCS JOINT INITIATIVE FOR TEACHER EDUCATION AND 10 RECRUITMENT **SECTION 3.1.(a)** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Board 11 12 of Governors of The University of North Carolina the sum of six hundred forty thousand dollars (\$640,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of six hundred 13 14 forty thousand dollars (\$640,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year. 15 **SECTION 3.1.(b)** These funds shall be used to establish eight personnel 16 positions for The University of North Carolina-North Carolina Community College 17 System (UNC-NCCCS) Joint Initiative for Teacher Education and Recruitment. These 18 employees shall have an office in and work with staff in the Regional Alternative 19 Licensure Centers of the Department of Public Instruction. Their responsibilities shall 20 be to help increase the number of certified teachers in the public schools of North 21 Carolina. Their specific tasks shall be as follows: Resolve curriculum issues between The University of North Carolina 22 (1)23 and the community colleges within each region to ensure seamless 24 articulation; 25 (2)Serve as licensure advisors to prospective teachers and assist with individual reviews for lateral entry candidates; 26 27 Offer admissions advice to community college students seeking to (3) transfer to four-year institutions; and 28 29 Recruit prospective teachers on community college campuses. (4)These funds shall also be used to ensure that these staff members can travel routinely 30 among all of The University of North Carolina and community college sites within a 31 32 region. 33 **SECTION 3.1.(c)** Each constituent institution of The University of North 34 Carolina with a teacher education program shall develop a 2+2 program in partnership 35 with one or more constituent institutions in the North Carolina Community College System by June 2007. 36 37 **SECTION 3.1.(d)** The UNC-NCCCS Joint Initiative for Teacher Education 38 and Recruitment shall report on the results of this initiative by September 1, 2006, and 39 annually thereafter to the State Board of Education, the Board of Governors, the State Board of Community Colleges, the Education Cabinet, the Joint Legislative Education 40 Oversight Committee, and the Office of State Budget and Management. The report shall 41 42 include information on all existing and planned 2+2 teacher education partnership programs and, at a minimum, the following performance outcomes by region in which 43 44 the advisors are working:

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A Teaching Fellows Program shall be administered by the North Carolina 1 (a) 2 Teaching Fellows Commission. The Teaching Fellows Program shall be used to provide 3 a four-year scholarship loan of six thousand five hundred dollars (\$6,500) per year to 4 North Carolina high school seniors interested in preparing to teach in the public schools 5 of the State. Beginning July 1, 2006, the Teaching Fellows Program shall also be used 6 to provide 50 two-year scholarship loans of six thousand five hundred dollars (\$6,500) per year to North Carolina college juniors who intend to teach mathematics or science in 7 8 the public middle schools or high schools of the State. The Commission shall also forgive the a two-year or a four-year loan if it finds that it is impossible for the recipient to teach for four years, 25 within seven years after graduation, at a North Carolina public school or at a school 26 27 operated by the United States government in North Carolina, because of fulfill the teaching requirement due to the death or permanent disability of the recipient. 28 " 29 30 **INCREASE FUNDS FOR THE PROSPECTIVE TEACHER SCHOLARSHIP** 31 32 LOAN PROGRAM 33 **SECTION 3.4.(a)** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Instruction the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the 34 35 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year for the Prospective Teacher Scholarship Loan Program. 36 **SECTION 3.4.(b)** The first priority for awards for these additional funds 37 38 shall be to students in the 2+2 UNC-NCCCS Teacher Education and Recruitment 39 Initiative. 40 PRINCIPALS EXECUTIVE PROGRAM FOR NEW PRINCIPALS 41 42 **SECTION 3.5.** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Board of 43 Governors of The University of North Carolina the sum of one hundred twenty-five 44 thousand dollars (\$125,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to support the
development and implementation of a new program for all new public school principals.
The program shall include a focus on the principal's responsibility for instructional
leadership, data-driven decision making, and positive teacher working conditions.
All newly hired principals in North Carolina shall be required to attend this
PEP-developed program for new principals during their first year of employment as a
principal.

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TEACHER WORKING CONDITIONS INITIATIVE

10 **SECTION 3.6.(a)** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Instruction the sum of two hundred fifteen thousand dollars 11 12 (\$215,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of two hundred ninety thousand dollars (\$290,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to administer the Governor's Teacher 13 14 Working Conditions Survey. These funds shall be used by the State Board of Education, 15 in collaboration with the Professional Teaching Standards Commission, to administer 16 the survey on a biennial basis, establish an advisory board to oversee implementation of 17 recommendations from the survey, and support the NC Network in providing 18 customized analysis for school improvement teams.

19 SECTION 3.6.(b) The State Board of Education may supplement these
 20 funds with gifts or other private funds donated for this purpose.

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TEACH FOR AMERICA

SECTION 3.7. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Instruction the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to support the Teach for America Program in North Carolina for the purpose of recruiting teachers into high-need schools.

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29 STANDARDS REVIEW OF MSA PROGRAMS

30 **SECTION 3.8.** The State Board of Education, in consultation with the Board 31 of Governors of The University of North Carolina, shall review standards for the 32 Masters in School Administration (MSA) programs to ensure that appropriate 33 competencies related to teacher retention, teacher evaluations, teacher support 34 programs, and teacher effectiveness are included and emphasized.

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36 EVALUATION OF SCHOOL PRINCIPALS

SECTION 3.9. The State Board of Education shall ensure that principals are evaluated annually as specified in G.S. 115C-333 and shall revise the standards for the evaluations of school administrators (SBE Policy QP-C-006) to include accountability measures of teacher retention, teacher support, and school climate. The State Board shall revise its evaluation instruments to reflect these changes.

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43 PLANNING TIME FOR TEACHERS

SECTION 3.10. The State Board of Education, in collaboration with the 1 2 North Carolina Professional Teaching Standards Commission, shall report on best 3 practices from North Carolina schools for providing a minimum of five hours per week within the instructional day for planning, collaborating with colleagues and parents, and 4 5 professional development, especially within elementary school schedules. The State 6 Board shall submit its report to the Education Cabinet by December 31, 2005. 7 The State Board shall disseminate this information about best practices to 8 schools and school systems across the State. 9 10 ONLINE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT RESOURCE CENTER FOR **TEACHERS AND PRINCIPALS** 11 12 **SECTION 3.11.(a)** The State Board of Education and the Department of 13 Public Instruction, in collaboration with the North Carolina Professional Teaching Standards Commission, shall develop a Web portal that catalogues high-quality 14 15 professional development opportunities for teachers and principals. 16 **SECTION 3.11.(b)** Funds to implement the systems will be requested by the 17 Department of Public Instruction based on the design. The State Budget Director and 18 the Chief Information Officer shall release funding upon approval of the Information 19 Technology project plan. 20 21 PART IV. TWENTY-FIRST- CENTURY HIGH SCHOOLS 22 23 LEARN AND EARN HIGH SCHOOLS 24 SECTION 4.1.(a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 25 Department of Public Instruction the sum of three million two hundred forty-seven thousand four hundred twenty-six dollars (\$3,247,426) in recurring funds and nine 26 27 hundred seventeen thousand five hundred dollars (\$917,500) in nonrecurring funds for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of nine million two hundred fifty-nine thousand 28 29 four hundred forty dollars (\$9,259,440) in recurring funds and one million dollars 30 (\$1,000,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2006-2007 fiscal year for the Learn and Earn high school workforce development program. The purpose of the program shall be to 31 32 create rigorous and relevant high school options that provide students with the 33 opportunity and assistance to earn an associate degree or two years of college credit by 34 the conclusion of the year after their senior year in high school. The State Board of 35 Education shall work closely with the Education Cabinet and the New Schools Project 36 in administering the program.

SECTION 4.1.(b) These funds shall be used to establish new high schools in which a local school administrative unit, two- and four-year colleges and universities, and local employers work together to ensure that high school and postsecondary college curricula operate seamlessly and meet the needs of participating employers. Funds shall not be allotted until Learn and Earn high schools are certified as operational.

42 **SECTION 4.1.(c)** The State Board of Education in consultation with the 43 State Board of Community Colleges and The University of North Carolina Board of 44 Governors, shall conduct an annual evaluation of this program. The evaluation shall

include measures as identified in G.S. 115C-238.55. It shall also include: (i) an 1 2 accounting of how funds and personnel resources were utilized and their impact on 3 student achievement, retention, and employability; (ii) recommended statutory and policy changes; and (iii) recommendations for improvement of the program. The State 4 5 Board of Education shall report the results of this evaluation to the Office of State 6 Budget and Management, the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, and the 7 Fiscal Research Division by September 15 of each year.

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SMALL SPECIALTY HIGH SCHOOLS PILOT PROGRAM

10 SECTION 4.2.(a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Instruction the sum of one million four hundred forty-six 11 12 thousand eight hundred seventy-seven dollars (\$1,446,877) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of one million four hundred forty-six thousand eight hundred 13 14 seventy-seven dollars (\$1,446,877) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year for a pilot program to 15 create 11 small specialty high schools within existing schools. The purpose of the 16 program shall be to improve graduation rates and achieve higher student performance as 17 measured by standard tests and postgraduate gainful employment or admission into an 18 institution of higher education. The State Board of Education shall work closely with the Education Cabinet and the New Schools Project in administering the program. 19

20 **SECTION 4.2.(b)** The State Board of Education shall conduct an evaluation 21 of this program. The evaluation shall include measures as identified in G.S. 115C-238.55. It shall also include: (i) an accounting of how funds and personnel 22 23 resources were utilized and their impact on student achievement, retention, and 24 employability; and (ii) recommendations for improvement of the program. The State 25 Board of Education shall report the results of this evaluation to the Office of State Budget and Management, the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, and the 26 27 Fiscal Research Division by November 15, 2006.

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THE CENTER FOR TWENTY-FIRST-CENTURY SKILLS

SECTION 4.3.(a) There is established the Center for 21st-Century Skills 30 within the North Carolina Business Committee for Education. The purpose of the 31 32 Center is to design curriculum, teacher training, and student assessment to support 33 students acquiring the knowledge and skills needed for the emerging workforce of the 21st century. 34

35 **SECTION 4.3.(b)** The North Carolina Business Committee for Education and the Center for 21st-Century Skills shall coordinate their efforts on high school 36 37 reform with the North Carolina New Schools Project.

38 **SECTION 4.3.(c)** The North Carolina Business Committee for Education and the Center for 21st-Century Skills shall work with the North Carolina Science, 39 Mathematics and Technology Education Center, the North Carolina School of Science 40 and Mathematics, the North Carolina Board of Science and Technology, and the 41 42 governing boards of education to research and propose options to create new or expand existing mathematics and science summer enrichment programs across the State and to 43 44 establish nonresidential high schools focused on mathematics, science, and technology.

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The Center shall also support efforts of the Futures for Kids Program to connect 1 2 students with the workforce needs of their home communities. 3 4 FLEXIBILITY FOR HIGH SCHOOL INNOVATION 5 SECTION 4.4.(a) G.S. 115C-238.51 reads as rewritten: The State Board of Education and the State Board of Community Colleges 6 "(d) 7 shall approve two cooperative innovative high school programs in each of the State's 8 economic development regions. The State Boards may approve cooperative innovative 9 high school programs recommended by the joint advisory committee or may approve 10 other programs that were not recommended. The State Boards shall approve all applications by March 15 of each year. No application shall be approved unless the 11 12 State Boards find that the application meets the requirements set out in this Part and that granting the application would achieve the purposes set out in G.S. 115C-238.50. 13 14 Priority shall be given to applications that are most likely to further State education 15 policies, to address the economic development needs of the economic development 16 regions in which they are located, and to strengthen the educational programs offered in 17 the local school administrative units in which they are located." 18 SECTION 4.4.(b) G.S. 116C-4 reads as rewritten: 19 "§ 116C-4. First in America Innovative Education Initiatives Act. 20 (a) The General Assembly strongly endorses the Governor's goal of making 21 North Carolina's system of education first in America by 2010. With that as the goal, the 22 Education Cabinet shall set as a priority cooperative efforts between secondary schools 23 and institutions of higher education so as to reduce the high school dropout rate, 24 increase high school and college graduation rates, decrease the need for remediation in 25 institutions of higher education, and raise certificate, associate, and bachelor degree completion rates. The Cabinet shall identify and support efforts that achieve the 26 27 following purposes: 28 (1)Support cooperative innovative high school programs developed under 29 Part 9 of Article 16 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes. 30 Improve high school completion rates and reduce high school dropout (2)31 rates. Close the achievement gap. 32 (3) 33 Create redesigned middle schools or high schools. (4) Provide flexible, customized programs of learning for high school 34 (5) 35 students who would benefit from accelerated, higher-level coursework or early graduation. 36 Establish high quality alternative learning programs. 37 (6)(7) Establish a virtual high school. 38 39 (8) Implement other innovative education initiatives designed to advance the State's system of education. 40 Small specialty high schools within existing schools, high school programs that are a 41 42 cooperative effort between public secondary schools and a constituent institution of The University of North Carolina, and high school programs that are a cooperative effort 43 between public secondary schools and a private college or university are exempt from 44

laws and rules applicable to local boards of education, local school administrative units, 1 community colleges, and constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina. 2 3 The Education Cabinet shall identify federal, State, and local funds that may (b) be used to support these initiatives. In addition, the Cabinet is strongly encouraged to 4 5 pursue private funds that could be used to support these initiatives. The Cabinet shall report by January 15, 2004, and annually thereafter, to the 6 (c) 7 Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on its activities under this section. 8 The annual reports may include recommendations for statutory changes needed to 9 support cooperative innovative initiatives, including programs approved under Part 9 of 10 Article 16 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes." 11 12 PART V. SUPPORTING FAMILIES AND CHILDREN FOR SCHOOL 13 **SUCCESS** 14 15 SCHOOL-BASED CHILD AND FAMILY SUPPORT TEAMS 16 **SECTION 5.1.(a)** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 17 Department of Public Instruction the sum of ten million six hundred sixty-five thousand 18 seven hundred fifty-four dollars (\$10,665,754) in recurring funds and five hundred 19 thousand dollars (\$500,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the 20 sum of thirteen million three hundred eighty-two thousand one hundred ninety-two 21 dollars (\$13,382,192) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to establish 100 school-based child and family support teams to support the educational achievement of at-risk children. 22 23 The purpose of the program is to better connect public schools with the health, mental 24 health, and social services needed by their students and families. **SECTION 5.1.(b)** These funds shall be used to support 100 school nurses 25 and 100 school social workers responsible for multidisciplinary assessments and for 26 27 referral and care coordination for at-risk students and their families at 100 public 28 schools in North Carolina. 29 30 **COMMUNITIES IN SCHOOLS SUPPORT AND EXPANSION** 31 SECTION 5.2. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 32 Department of Public Instruction the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year and the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) 33 34 for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to support the Communities in Schools of North Carolina 35 program. These funds shall be used to establish an 18-county Communities in Schools partnership in the northeast, help new and existing local Communities in Schools 36 programs obtain federal and private grants, and otherwise support the educational 37 38 achievement of at-risk students.
