#### **BILL SUMMARY:**

This bill requires the State Board of Education to implement curriculum on the 1898 Wilmington Race Riot and provide teacher workshops for integrating the materials into instruction.

**ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY**: There are any number of ways to develop and implement a curriculum. This analysis assumes that a curriculum on the 1898 Wilmington Race Riot would be taught at the 4<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grade levels, and would include a teaching guide, teacher workshops, and additional learning experiences. The table below, based on estimates provided by the Department of Public Instruction, details the costs of developing and implementing such a curriculum:
